### From the Pastor's Desk

'Come, you that are blessed by my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world; <sup>35</sup> for I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, <sup>36</sup> I was naked and you gave me clothing, I was sick and you took care of me, I was in prison and you visited me' (Matthew 25:34-36).

As you know, I attended the ELCA churchwide assembly in Milwaukee. I was one of those who voted in favor of the ELCA to become a sanctuary church body. The ELCA made a headline in the news when it became the first North American denomination to declare itself a sanctuary church body. "As a sanctuary church, the ELCA is committed to serving and supporting migrant children and

families in communities across the country." Since the ELCA has become a "sanctuary church," Lutherans have been asking the same question, "what does it mean to be a sanctuary church?"

Society is divided over the issue of immigration. The ELCA is part of this society, and its members have many different views related to immigrants and refugees. Our presiding Bishop, Bishop Elizabeth Eaton, and our Synod Bishop, Bishop Gerald Mansholt, explained our position in two separate letters. I shared with you on Sunday, August 18, 2019, what sanctuary church means, and I will summarize the answer to this question here.

The action of the churchwide assembly comes as a result of our commitment to follow Jesus Christ's command to love our neighbor and to welcome strangers. It was not a surprise for the ELCA to become a sanctuary church since the ELCA has been helping refugees and migrants since World War II through LIRS, Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Services.

In medieval Europe "fugitives really could escape the Death penalty by claiming sanctuary in a church. The catch was that afterward, they usually had to go into permanent exile." Prof. of church history, Karl Shoemaker, explains how sanctuary church in medieval Europe used its authority to protect fugitives. "It would be inappropriate in the extreme to carry weapons into the church or to arrest someone or to exercise force within the church."<sup>3</sup>

In medieval Europe, sanctuary enjoyed a legal standing, but that is not the case in the United States. The ELCA affirms, according to Bishop Gerald Mansholt, "The assembly is not asking any congregation or individual to do anything illegal."

It is up to each congregation to determine how to become a sanctuary church. It depends on each congregation's context. The church might provide space for immigrants to live, host English as a Second Language Classes, provide clothes or provide financial and legal support...etc.

Lutheran immigrants established the ELCA. So, the ELCA is an immigrant church. Our faith, tradition and history call us to advocate and to assist the most vulnerable and those affected by the broken immigration system. Sanctuary means that the ELCA is committed "to continue to provide concrete resources and ministering to human need."<sup>4</sup>

Dear church, we might have different views, but our differences should not hinder us from working together to improve our immigration system and to make our world the kingdom of God on earth.

- 1. The meeting was called to order by Bob Henning at 7:20 pm.
- 2. Devotions were led by Pastor Niveen Sarras; Stewardship and Stewards
- 3. Church officer reports
- a. Secretary report The May secretary report was read and a motion was made by Linda to accept the minutes as printed and read. Second was made by Marge. Motion passed.

The April minutes were previously approved via e-mail replies. Based on e-mail times - first accepted by Marge and second by Judy. Motion passed

- b. Treasurer report Matt presented the Income & Expense report and the Current Position and Designated Funds report for May. He also presented the May and YTD Profit & Loss Budget Performance. A motion was was made by Janci to accept and hold the treasurers report for audit. Second was made by Judy. Motion passed.

#### **Greater Wausau Christian Services April to June 2019 Newsletter**

On Saturday, June 1 Greater Wausau Christian Services fostered support for the restorative justice community gardens that is now known as the Gaining Grounds Gardens. The garden has been established at the southwest corner of Grand Avenue and Thomas Street.

GWCS organized a Thrivent Action Event to fundraise for the event and financially contributed to the purchase of the fruit trees. This was made possible with funds dispersed directly out of GWCS operating budget. Several board members of GWCS also took part in planting trees on the day of the event.

The event was a collaborative effort that involved: horticultural instructor Brianna Wright, of the UWSP at Wausau campus; City of Wausau leadership including Mayor Robert Mielke; city forester Blain Peterson; the City of Wausau Public Works Director Eric Lindman; and the Marathon County Jail which allowed five current inmates on work release to help plant trees.

GWCS will establish commemorative signage at the Gaining Grounds Garden site and give Christopher Wilke special recognition for having given birth to the concept of the fruit tree segment of the gardens as well as his leadership to accomplish the work.

The food that is grown in the garden will be used to stock local food pantries with fresh produce. The general public will also be welcome to taste the fruit and learn a little about the fruit tree varieties: apple, pear, plum and cherry trees all have descriptive sign posts located at the base of the trees.

Upon invitation from Mayor Robert Mielke, Greater Wausau Christian Services is now working to continue planting fruit trees as a work of restorative justice in the City of Wausau's other public green spaces. Donations can be sent to GWCS. 319 4th Street Suite #6, Wausau WI 54403
