From the Pastor's Desk

"Who do people say the Son of Man is?" (Matthew 16:13)

Jesus' life story has influenced the course of human history. His life directly or indirectly affected the lives of Christians and even non-Christians.

Who is Jesus Christ? This question has invited clergy, scholars, laypeople and non-Christians to reflect on the identity of Jesus. For example, Jews do not believe that Jesus of Nazareth is the Christ. Other scholars, such as Thomas L. Brodie, an Irish Dominican priest and theologian, question the historicity of Jesus. Brodie believes that Jesus never existed as an historical person and he did not establish Christianity. As a result, the Dominican order banned him from writing

and lecturing. There are many more scholars of the New Testament who deny the existence of Jesus our Lord.

Last week I completed reading a book by Iranian-American Muslim writer and scholar Reza Aslan entitled *Zealot: The Life and Times of Jesus of Nazareth*. Aslan discusses the historical account of the life of Jesus Christ. He believes that Jesus existed, and he was one of many failed Messiahs. He denies the virgin birth and the resurrection. Jesus was not divine, but was "a political, rebellious and eschatological leader whose proclamation of the coming kingdom of God was a call for regime change, for ending Roman hegemony over Judea and ending a corrupt and oppressive aristocratic priesthood." (Aslan, Reza. "Books". Retrieved July 29, 2013.)

This book received national attention in the US following a Fox News interview in 2013. My critique of Aslan relies on him building his argument on specific texts, like Josephus, and taking them at face value. He ignores the fact that Josephus was biased toward the Jews and implemented the Romans' agenda in writing the history of the Jews.

Furthermore, Aslan lacks expertise in the subject. He does not have advanced degrees in the New Testament or on the history of Christianity, but he carries an advanced degree in the sociology of religion. I firmly believe that his book is not trustworthy as an historical account. It should not be taken seriously.

Let us go back to our question. Who is Jesus? Why are many people, even Christians, doubting his identity as the Messiah, Savior and God? Why do so many people have a firm intention to diminish Jesus? The reasons are many. I will focus on a few of them.

Firstly, Jesus is the number one enemy of Satan. Satan works hard to trick us into believing that Jesus is not our Savior, and that he never

existed. Satan works in the church and seminaries to make us doubt our faith. Remember, my friends, that Jesus has already defeated Satan for us (Colossians 2:15).

Secondly, the church committed a sin against Jesus Christ and his followers. Historically speaking, the inquisitions, religious wars and child and women abuse have impacted negatively on many Christians. Many Christians are leaving the church because they no longer trust the church. As a result, many churches are closing every year. The church needs to repent and seek reconciliation with God and her members. We need to keep in mind that if the church fails us, Christ will never fail us.

Thirdly, the Internet contributes to declining church attendance. Christians get help anywhere they want on the Internet. No need to go to church to find answers to our questions. It is easy to stay at home and watch services on the Internet or TV. Every day thousands of people search for spirituality online but not in the church. Now, the internet becomes the key to the secularization of the church and society. Many Christians trust the Internet much more than their church. We cannot take the information on the Internet at face value. The Internet cannot replace our Bible or the church.

Finally, as people, we like to share stories with one another. But when it comes to sharing our story with Jesus Christ, we prefer to be silent. I need to hear your story with Jesus Christ because your story strengthens my faith. Not sharing our faith story is like putting the light under a bushel instead of on a candlestick (Matthew 5:5: Pastor is paraphrasing). Your spiritual experience with God is not meant to be a personal matter. God wants you to share your faith story with others. Many people are hungry and thirsty to know about Jesus Christ. So, share your faith in words and deeds.

As we are welcoming a new year. I invite you to reflect on the same question: who is Jesus? Your answer will have an impact not only on your life, but also on the life of your family, community and church. It is not an easy question and the answer will not be easy, too.

DID YOU KNOW?

Immanuel Lutheran and First English Lutheran were close neighbors at one time. Immanuel was located at First Street and Franklin (the site of the present day Eye Clinic of Wisconsin) and First English was located a block or two south on First Street (now part of a parking lot). These close neighbors got along well

and did not hesitate to share programs. Their youth groups often did things together, for example. In 1944 Pastor Achterberg of First English announced his retirement. It was proposed that the two congregations merge since they were so close together and got along so well. The church councils of both congregations approved the merger. Pastor Quello of Immanuel was to be the pastor of this merged church. A name was even selected -- Central Lutheran of Wausau. It was assumed that a new church building would be built after the war. But the president of the American Lutheran Church synod, of which First English was a part, nixed the proposal, and the proposed merger collapsed. So the two congregations went their separate ways. Immanuel built a new building in 1949 at its present site and First English moved to a new colonial style building on Third Avenue a few years later. They became part of the same church body in the merger of 1960. --- Al Solomonson
