From the Pastor's Desk

"Do you not know that all of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? We were buried therefore with him by baptism into death, so that as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might walk in the newness of life." (Rom 6:3-4)

Lent has two principal elements: preparing for or recalling Baptism and Penance. Since the early church until now, Lent has been the time for preparing catechumens¹ for their baptism at the Easter Vigil. At the same time, the whole church anticipates Easter through acts of repentance and reconciliation.² The early church father, Irenaus of Lyons (130-200 A.D), wrote about Lent, which lasted for three days. It was not

until the Council of Nicaea 325 A.D, that the church fathers discussed a 40-day Lenten season of fasting.³ Lent, wrote Pope St. *Leo the Great* (440-461 A.D), is "a holy retreat of forty days during which we are to regain the purity of soul."⁴ Hence, Lent invites us to imitate Christ by going into a spiritual desert where we focus more intensely on self-examination and putting off the old sinful human to put on Christ and receive the graces that Easter promises.⁵

I will attempt to explain how we are going to incorporate confession and preparing ourselves for the renewal of our baptismal promises on Easter Sunday.

Confession:

"Even now, says the Lord, return to me with your whole heart ..." (Joel 2:12). This prophetic verse marks the beginning of Ash Wednesday and sets the tone for the entire season of Lent. God calls us to repent and to reconcile with God and our sisters and brothers. Following the tradition of the early church, we will confess our sins every Sunday—on communion and non-communion Sundays. Remember that the confession is not limited to Sundays. God calls us to examine our conscience every day and to prepare our hearts to receive our Lord and Savior in his glorious resurrection.

Confession is an essential element of our faith. Martin Luther wrote in the Large Catechism, "Therefore, when I exhort you to go to

confession, I am doing nothing but exhorting you to be a Christian." I strongly encourage you to confess your sin not only in public confession but also by confessing it to God alone in prayer or confess it personally to your pastor to receive pastoral care.

Baptism

Lent is the church's call to remember our baptism. Not all of us are catechumens, but Lent is a time to reflect on our personal baptism and to prepare ourselves for the renewal of our baptismal promises on Easter day. Each Sunday during Lent the liturgy and sermon will be related to the confession of sin and baptism. The dismissal will summarize our baptismal vocation.

Go in peace... live among God's faithful people; hear the word of God and share in the Lord's Supper; proclaim the good news of God in Christ through word and deed; serve all people following the example of Jesus, and strive for justice and peace in all the earth.⁷

I pray that the season of Lent helps you to focus on Jesus Christ, grow in faith and to reconcile with your neighbor. May the Lord answer my prayers. Amen.

"No Wonder They Crucified Him: Discover why Jesus was a dangerous man." by Christianity Today (Editor), Christian Bible Studies (Editor)

5 Session Bible Study

Of all the people admired in the world today, Jesus of Nazareth continually ranks at the top of the list. Even those who don't call themselves Christians regard Jesus as one of the wisest teachers and most loving leaders the world has ever known. He is still making the covers of magazines and being talked about in coffee shops with a popularity like no other person who has walked this earth. So why did his contemporaries kill him?

This five-session study examines Jesus as not simply meek and mild, but as a dangerous man because he was and is the God who is dangerously good. Take a fresh look at Jesus' call to action.

Session One: March 8, 2020 - Get Off the Fence

Jesus won't accept neutrality.

Matthew 12:22-32

We have to buck life in a fence-walking world. Ground yourself on God's side of the fence through spiritual disciplines.

Session Two: March 15, 2020 - Complete the Circle of Grace and Works Sometimes Jesus sets conditions on grace.

Luke 6:37-42

As Christians, we know that we get to spend eternity in heaven, not because we're such great people, but because Jesus is. Yet, what does that mean as we respond to the remarkable grace God has shown us in Christ?

Session Three: March 22, 2020 - Check Your Bags

What are you dragging around with you?

Matthew 19:16-30

All of us carry loads that are often of our own making. Lent is a great time to look at those loads and see what needs to be repacked and what needs to be tossed.

Session Four: April 5, 2020 - Come Die with Me

Sometimes Jesus is really scary.

Matthew 16:21-28

There are few words Jesus ever spoke that are scarier: "If anyone would come after me, he must deny himself and take up his cross and follow me. For whoever wants to save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for me will find it."

Session Five: April 19, 2020 - Follow Me

Jesus invites us to breakfast and beyond.

John 21:1-25

Jesus conquered death and rose from the dead! It's the most joyous news ever announced. After his resurrection, he stayed around to have breakfast with his most faithful followers.

economically and politically. As part of the Lenten series, we will focus on the poor and disadvantaged in the Old Testament. This session of Lent will provide you with an overview of how the subjects of poverty and the poor are treated. Following the overview, we will study Zechariah 7:4-8:8, which talks about true fasting that entails accompanying the underprivileged. Throughout the Old Testament, God is depicted as the defender of the poor. The session will end by giving temporary examples of how to accompany the poor and defend them.

Ecumenism at Immanuel

DID YOU KNOW?

During the 1960s Pastor Duane Hoven instigated many contacts with other Christians and with the Rabbi and members at Mt. Sinai Temple. His friendship with the

Rabbi allowed him to speak at the synagogue and in turn the rabbi contributed insight to one of the Bethel Bible Study classes. Hoven organized the first clergy association in the area, a group that included nearly all the clergy in the area. He was its first chairperson.

Taking a cue from Pope John XXIII and the Second Vatican Council where more openness to other Christian points of view was encouraged, Pastor Hoven and Father McGarty of St. Matthew's Catholic parish enlisted a core group of members from each of the congregations to meet in small groups in member homes. These groups consisted of three couples from each parish with the intent of discussing the commonalities and differences found in our respective beliefs using a book called Living Room Dialogues. It was deemed successful by all who took part in the two-year program. Hoven also lectured at St. Anthony Seminary near Marathon and was invited to the ordination of deacons at St. Mary's parish in Marathon. In 1970 he was invited to participate in an evening liturgical service at St. Mary's Catholic in Wausau, the first non-Catholic in Wausau to preach from a Catholic pulpit.

This ecumenical tradition continued at Immanuel to the present day. The

congregation has joined in the past with Catholic and other protestant congregations in worship, concerts, and youth education. We have enjoyed especially good relations with our neighbor to the north, St. Michael's parish where we have shared thanksgiving services, Palm Sunday marches, and vacation Bible schools. Pastor Sherry Billberg of Immanuel is likely the first female pastor to give the homily in a Catholic church. We also have had joint meetings with members of the Mt. Sinai synagogue. Indeed, Immanuel has not been a closed-minded congregation.

2020 Flower Instructions published by the Altar Guild:

The Altar Flowers are a welcome offering to our worship. They are a symbol of new life in Christ. For all these reasons, we appreciate everyone who is moved to give flowers on a Sunday. People have given flowers in thanksgiving to God, for a family member's birthday, wedding anniversary or other blessing. They are also given in memory of a departed loved one or friend.

- 1. The flower chart will no longer be posted in the Narthex. We encourage members to bring flowers from their garden, order them to remember a special occasion or just to brighten the sanctuary.
- 2. You may contact one of the Altar Guild members or contact the secretary at (715) 842-3644 to let her know that flowers will be brought for the service.
- 3. If you wish to place a notice in the bulletin, you will need to let the secretary know by Tuesday.
- 4. Members may order them and bring them to church prior to the service.
- 5. If the arrangement or flowers are already in a vase, they can be placed behind the altar on the flower stand.
- 6. If a vase will be needed, the altar guild can place a vase filled with water outside of the sacristy.
- 7. At the close of the service, please pick up the flowers and take them home.
- 8. There are no flowers placed on the altar during Lent.
