From the Pastor's Desk

Dear friends, grace and peace to you. The Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Service invited me to write a short article on Psalm 67 to post on their website: <https://www.lirs.org/commentary-Psalm-67>

I already preached this Psalm on August 16, 2020. I would like to share it with you here.

The central theme of Psalm 67 is that God's inclusive blessing and grace extend to all nations. God uses Israel as a means of grace to bless the nations. The United States is the most powerful and wealthy nation on earth. Can God use this nation to bless others? I am not talking on the political level, but on a personal and organizational level. Let me share my experience in the United States, especially with the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA). I am a Palestinian Christian, born and raised in Bethlehem. I immigrated to the United States in 2008 to pursue my Ph.D. in Hebrew Bible. Later, I completed a

Master of Divinity in preparation to become an ELCA pastor because it was impossible to do that in Palestine. I came from a low-income family that was unable to support my education. The political unrest between Palestine and Israel made it difficult to find opportunities to answer God's call and to live with dignity.

The Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago (LSTC) served as an agent of God's blessing to many international students from different nations. Students from Latin America, Korea, Middle East, India, Africa, and Europe were blessed by LSTC on spiritual, intellectual, and material levels. The LSTC community blessed me before I arrived in the USA by providing me all I needed to immigrate, including assistance with my application for a student visa, and providing a scholarship and an airline ticket. The ELCA granted me a scholarship to study for my Master of Divinity degree at Pacific Lutheran Theological Seminary (PLTS) in Berkeley, California. I enjoyed God's abundant blessings at PLTS. Without the help of the ELCA, LSTC, and PLTS I would not have been able to become the person I am today. Currently, I am called to serve a congregation as Pastor of Immanuel Lutheran Church in Wausau, Wisconsin.

The author of Psalm 67 begins with a summary of the Aaronic benediction in Numbers 6:24-26, "Yahweh bless you and keep you; Yahweh's face shine on you, and be gracious to you; Yahweh's face turn towards you, and give you peace" (my translation). In our liturgy, we end the service with this blessing, or benediction. The psalmist begins with the Aaronic blessing to emphasize God's blessings to all nations, not to a particular group. The reason for God's blessing of Israel is that all people know God's saving power through Israel. God chose the descendants of Abraham and Sarah to bless the nations through them (Genesis 12:1-3). Israel's mission is to bless others.

Bishop Theodore Mascarenhas interprets Psalm 67 through the lens of church mission theology. As he states:

The psalmist [in Psalm 67] has used material available to him like the Aaronic Blessing but has so remodeled it as to make it missionary minded. Retaining all the theological import that the blessing carries, he has instilled in it the Abrahamic hope and has portrayed Israel as a blessing to the nations...Receiving God's blessing, it [Israel] becomes a blessing to the peoples because it teaches them by life and worship how to be participants in the blessing. [1]

God's blessing helps all nations to know God's saving power that freed and liberated the Israelites from slavery and oppression in Egypt. God also executes justice to all nations and guides them all (v.4), which means God is present in their lives. The outcome of this blessing is that all people will praise God (vv. 3, 5), and experience joy (v. 4). The psalmist offers a universal invitation to all nations to celebrate God's work among the Israelites. The image of inclusiveness is emphasized in the second book of Isaiah, as Isaiah 56:7 reflects on God's universal invitation for all the nations to pray in God's house.

Near the end of Psalm 67, the reason for the blessing is revealed as the abundant harvest (v. 6). The earth produces food for the benefit of all nations. People who receive abundantly share the blessing with the disadvantaged people. In this way, developing nations taste God's grace. Sharing our food and resources with the nations is part of the church's mission to sustain and nurture life. In Matthew 15:21-28, Jesus sets an example for how to share God's blessings with the nations. Jesus heals the daughter of a Canaanite woman who is, according to the Jewish law, considered as Gentile, unclean, and an outsider.

Psalm 67 reflects my experience as an immigrant to the United States. The ELCA became the agent of blessing to me, and I am praising God with joy for these blessings. Now, I am an agent of God's blessings, too. I am sharing God's blessings with the people around me here and with my family back home in Palestine.

Please help us replace Quilts & Kits destroyed in the Beirut. The blast destroyed three of **Lutheran World Relief's** 40-foot shipping containers, which were stored in the port and held more than 22,000 LWR Mission Quilts, 100 cartons of School Kits, 300 cartons of Personal Care Kits and 125 cartons of Baby Care Kits that were being prepared for distribution to an estimated 24,550 men, women and children who were already in great need.

ILC will not be collecting items for the Personal Care and School kits for LWR. We will be collecting monetary donations that will be sent to LWR in early September. Our communities are significantly shaped by census data, and Census 2020 will update these numbers for the first time in 10 years. The ELCA is an official partner of the 2020 Census to encourage the most accurate count possible.

Members of the ELCA are strongly encouraged to respond to the 2020 Census online using a desktop computer, laptop, smartphone, or tablet, and can also respond by phone or mail. A Few Ideas for Service Activities:

- Phone, send a note card or, better yet- do both- to someone that is isolated, homebound or in a senior living facility.
- Drop off a goody bag or two with new reading material and small treats to a care facility earmarking it to be given to someone(s) who doesn't have family to provide those little extras that bring pleasure to their day.
- Bring a simple meal to someone that could use a break; for example, an overworked parent with youngsters, someone with limited resources or a person who is recuperating.
- Offer to pick up a grocery order, run some errands, or take someone shopping.
- Volunteer to do some household chores for someone who could use the help.
- Volunteer some time at a food pantry or food distribution center (Neighbors Place, Blessings in a Backpack, Salvation Army). This is a great group activity if you have others to join with you as a team!
- Help with yard work for a physically vulnerable individual.
- Share your garden produce.
- Drop off some school supplies at a local school, with the items earmarked for financially vulnerable students.
- Make a simple video reading a picture book and post it on social media for families with little ones to enjoy.
- Drop off some coffee and donuts for Open Door clients. Open Door hours are early morning to around noon M-F.
- Donate new personal care items to The Women's Community or The Salvation Army.

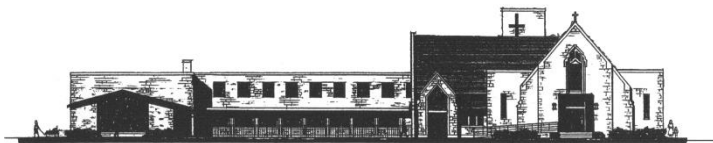

IMMANUEL HISTORY – Fair Week at Immanuel



Until about 70 years ago, Immanuel had a food stand at the Wisconsin Valley Fair in Wausau. It was considered a tradition, so it is likely that congregation operated the stand at least since 1930. Pastor Victor Quello who served the congregation from late 1941 to 1945, recalled the memories of “all those good smells from the pie-makers downstairs (in the kitchen) . . . I think I hauled up to 135 pies a day from the church to the fairgrounds.” One wonders, however, how the church got enough sugar to bake hundreds of pies during the strict rationing of many food products during the war years. It took a lot of time and effort from many volunteers to run a food stand at the fair. I am guessing that other food items such as hamburgers, hot dogs, and breakfast items were also sold. Certainly, soda pop and lots of coffee would have been available. There is no record that the congregation operated the food stand after the new building was erected in 1949. No doubt, the kitchen was not ready for a lot of pie baking until the basement area was completed. Records of the Ladies Aid indicate that the congregation sold the stand in July of 1951 to the Ladies Auxiliary of the Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW). No doubt, there was a sigh of relief from many members knowing that they would not have to invest so much time at the food stand again.

Immanuel Lutheran Church Council Special Meeting - Monday July 13, 2020

Meeting via Zoom

Members present:

President Bob Henning, vice-president Linda Hulstrom, treasurer Matt Munson, financial secretary Patti Busche, secretary Mike Steltenpohl, Pastor Niveen Sarras, evangelism Janci Treutel, stewardship Rick Lohr, worship Judy Kort,

Members absent: Education Judy Nickolai

1. Devotions were waived because this was a special purpose council meeting
2. The meeting was called to order by Bob Henning at 6:07pm.
3. Pastor's report

a. Maggie Westaby will be moving from the seminary but the \$500 reimbursement money for moving will not be provided to her from the seminary until December. Total costs for moving were estimated to be as follows; \$450 for hotels, \$250 for gas, \$150 for meals for a total of \$850. A motion was made by Mike and seconded by Rick to make a recommendation to the ILC scholarship committee to give Maggie the \$850 now with the understanding that ILC would be paid back the \$500 when she is reimbursed from the seminary in December. Motion passed.

b. Pastor Niveen had discussions with pastors from area churches as well as the synod and feels that most Pastors are not keeping regular church hours due to the Covid-19, but instead are now working from home. She feels more comfortable working from home as well so she requested permission from the council to work from home. The council voted and the majority ruled to allow her to work from home. She began this on Monday July 13th.

4. Officer and Committee Reports were waived because this was a special purpose council meeting.
5. Purpose of Special Purpose Council Meeting - The Reopening of the Church

a. Pastor Niveen feels that is is too much burden on her to handle the in-person services all by herself. On Sunday July 5th, the air conditioning wasn't working in the sanctuary and after she could not get it working she chose to move the service downstairs to the fellowship hall where the air conditioning was working, but had no one to help her do so.

b. Then on Sunday July 12th, Pastor Niveen and Kathy Knox had to change one of the banners because the verse was not appropriate for that Sunday of the church calendar.

c. It was discussed that the alter guild should still be sure that the correct paraments and banners are in place and check the oil in the candles. Pastor Niveen will handle the needs for communion herself to minimize the number of people making contact with the sacrament at this time.

d. It was also discussed to request one head usher attend each in-person service to be available to help out if unforeseen circumstances arise. Judy Kort will call Mike Schwede to ask him if he can make arrangements for that to happen.

6. A motion was made by Judy Kort to adjourn the meeting. A second was made by Patti. Motion passed. Meeting adjourned at 6:45pm.
7. Closing devotion was waived.
