# From the Pastor's Desk

Dear Immanuel Lutheran Church,

At the last council meeting on January 19, 2021, The majority of the ILC Church Council decided to return to in-person worship services. This decision is effective Sunday, February 21, 2021, following Ash Wednesday, with two services: one at 9:00 AM with masks required and one at 10:30 AM with masks optional. Pastor Sarras will offer ashes at both services with Holy Communion, being as this is the third Sunday of the month. These two services will be held the first Sunday of every month as we advance. The remaining Sundays of the month will be according to the schedule below:

• Sunday, February 21, 2021, 9:00 AM masks required, 10:30 AM masks optional.

- Sunday, February 28, 2021, 9:00 AM masks required.
- Sunday, March 7, 2021, 9:00 AM masks required, 10:30 AM masks optional.
- Sunday, March 14, 2021, 9:00 AM masks optional.
- Sunday, March 21, 2021, 9:00 AM masks required.
- Sunday, March 28, 2021, 9:00 AM masks optional.
- Sunday, April 4, 2021, 9:00 AM masks required, 10:30 AM masks optional.

# Midweek and Holy Week Lent Services


All the midweek Lent services will be virtual unless you hear otherwise.

The theme for the midweek and the Holy Week Lent services is "RETURN TO THE LORD."

During this season of Lent, we will consider the theme "Return to the Lord" and examine how the call to return played out in practical ways for the people who walked alongside Christ as He demonstrated and carried out God's grace and mercy on our behalf, taking God's wrath upon Himself, setting the stage for God to "turn and relent, and leave a blessing behind Him" (Joel 2:14). Each service in this series focuses on a particular event in the Passion, with a special focus on the people involved in the event. Each service emphasizes how we have turned away from the Lord, and to reinforce and rejoice in God's call for us to return to God with all our heart.


• Wednesday of Lent 1: "Return to Prayer."

- Wednesday of Lent 2: "Return from Betrayal."
- Wednesday of Lent 3: "Return from False Witness."
- Wednesday of Lent 4: "Return from Denial."
- Wednesday of Lent 5: "Return to the Kingdom of God."
- Holy (Maundy) Thursday: "Return to the Table."
- Good Friday: "Return to Truth."
- Holy Saturday / Easter Vigil: "Return to the Church."
- Easter Sunday: "Return and See."



The series I am using for Lent on Sundays is from the ELCA World Hunger; what will it take to end hunger? I have ordered 25 copies of the study booklets with 25 calendars. You are encouraged to pick up your copy from the church.

The church council have decided to launch a campaign to donate money for the ELCA World Hunger. As part of our Lent spiritual practices, you are encouraged to set aside every single day the amount of money you choose to designate for the ELCA World Hunger. For example, set aside \$2 every day until Easter Sunday, which will be \$80 and then write a check to ILC and put in the memo ELCA world hunger.



**Sunday School Children** will receive Lent materials in the mail to guide them through the Lenten Journey. These will be mailed during the second week of February. Parents/Grandparents are encouraged to work with the children in their studies.

# 4 Virtual Session Bible Studies at 10:30 AM

Of all the people admired in the world today, Jesus of Nazareth continually ranks at the top of the list. Even those who don't call themselves Christians regard Jesus as one of the wisest teachers and most loving leaders the world has ever known. He is still making the covers of magazines and being talked about in coffee shops with a popularity like no other person who has walked this earth. So why did his contemporaries kill him?

This five-session study examines Jesus as not simply meek and mild, but as a dangerous man because he was and is the God who is dangerously good. Take a fresh look at Jesus' call to action.

# Session One: February 28, 2021 - Get Off the Fence

Jesus won't accept neutrality.

Matthew 12:22–32

We have to buck life in a fence-walking world. Ground yourself on God's side of the fence through spiritual disciplines.

# Session Two: March 14, 2021 - Complete the Circle of Grace and Works

Sometimes Jesus sets conditions on grace.

Luke 6:37-42

As Christians, we know that we get to spend eternity in heaven, not because we're such great people, but because Jesus is. Yet, what does that mean as we respond to the remarkable grace God has shown us in Christ?

# Session Three: March 21, 2021 - Check Your Bags

What are you dragging around with you?

Matthew 19:16–30

All of us carry loads that are often of our own making. Lent is a great time to look at those loads and see what needs to be repacked and what needs to be tossed.

Session Four: March 28, 2021 - Come Die with Me

Sometimes Jesus is really scary.

Matthew 16:21–28

There are few words Jesus ever spoke that are scarier: "If anyone would come after me, he must deny himself and take up his cross and follow me. For whoever wants to save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for me will find it."

# THE DECADE OF THE SIXTIES AT IMMANUEL Part One

The recent death of our former pastor, Duane Hoven, who served Immanuel from 1961 to 1970, brings to mind the issues of that tumultuous decade of the 1960s. President Kennedy was assassinated in 1963 and before the decade had ended his brother, Robert, and civil rights leader, Martin Luther King also fell to assassins. Two contentious issues stand out: the cry for civil rights for African Americans, especially in the south, and the American entry into the war between North and South Vietnam. Pastor Hoven often used the gospel to speak to the injustice of racial segregation and the Jim Crow laws that effectively kept the black population in the south from participating in our democracy and tended to keep them impoverished economically. Politically, blacks fared better in the north, but there still were many examples of discrimination in the northern states as well. Wausau was still lily white and known previously as a "sun down town," meaning that Afro American visitors were expected to leave before sundown. Hoven worked with Evelyn Osswald, the owner of the Central Hotel on Scott Street and a voice for civil rights, to bring young men of African American Heritage from the Blackwell Job Corps Center for an overnight stay at the hotel and arranged for Immanuel members to host them on Sunday. Many Immanuel members readily volunteered, and it turned out to be a successful project. Hoven was appointed by Mayor

Kannenberg to head the first Commission on Human Rights in Wausau. He was active in many aspects of the Wausau community and held several leadership positions.

The U.S. participation in the Viet Nam war became increasingly contentious in the second half of the decade. The congregation had a number of young men serving in Viet Nam, and Pastor Hoven wrote to them frequently. From them he learned how dangerous the wartime conditions were. He also was alarmed by the criticism the mostly young protestors of the war were encountering. This prompted him to join with local members of the clergy to pay for an ad concerning the war, the thrust of which was that voicing opposition to the war was not unpatriotic.

Pastor Hoven gave me a copy of an account of his years in Wausau. He appreciated the congregational support during his nine years at Immanuel, but he did offer that there were members who thought his sermons were too political. He remarked on this as follows: "My Sunday sermons frequently made reference to racial concerns, discussion of the so-called Generation Gap, and growing frustration with American forces fighting in Vietnam. . . . I soon became aware of voices in the parish that were disturbed and upset by my sermons and comments."

Many members of the clergy were confronted by the dilemma facing them. Should they respond to the issues confronting society or should they take the safe way out and avoid controversy in their sermons and other messages to their parishes. Pastor Hoven was convinced the gospel should be preached and that many of Christ's messages to His followers were directed at the injustices in the world that face Christians. Pastor Hoven did not retreat from facing the issues. He was not being political but preached the need for a scriptural response to injustice in the world. Pastor Hoven frequently reminded the congregation that Christians are not "of" the world but are "in" the world. Our Christian faith should not be confined inside the walls of Immanuel on Sunday morning only. The dissenters in the parish did not get much traction and had only minimal effect. He definitely left a mark on the congregation of Immanuel, an imprint that lasted for decades. Pastor Hoven did not preach to complacency. (To be continued)

### The Gift of Love

<sup>13</sup> If I speak in the tongues of mortals and of angels, but do not have love, I am a noisy gong or a clanging cymbal. <sup>2</sup> And if I have prophetic powers, and understand all mysteries and all knowledge, and if I have all faith, so as to remove mountains, but do not have love, I am nothing. <sup>3</sup> If I give away all my possessions, and if I hand over my body so that I may boast, <sup>[a]</sup> but do not have love, I gain nothing.

<sup>4</sup>Love is patient; love is kind; love is not envious or boastful or arrogant <sup>5</sup> or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; <sup>6</sup> it does not rejoice in wrongdoing, but rejoices in the truth. <sup>7</sup> It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things.

<sup>8</sup> Love never ends. But as for prophecies, they will come to an end; as for tongues, they will cease; as for knowledge, it will come to an end. <sup>9</sup> For we know only in part, and we prophesy only in part; <sup>10</sup> but when the complete comes, the partial will come to an end.

<sup>11</sup> When I was a child, I spoke like a child, I thought like a child, I reasoned like a child; when I became an adult, I put an end to childish ways. <sup>12</sup> For now we see in a mirror, dimly, <sup>[b]</sup> but then we will see face to face. Now I know only in part; then I will know fully, even as I have been fully known. <sup>13</sup> And now faith, hope, and love abide, these three; and the greatest of these is love.

Members present: Pastor Niveen Sarras, President Bob Henning, vice-president Linda Hulstrom, Treasurer Matt Munson, financial secretary Patti Busche, stewardship Rick Lohr, worship Judy Kort and Sally Scinto-Reinertson, Properties. Members absent: Judy Nickolai

Devotions were led by Bob based on Matthew 18:3 – Continuous conversion. We should continue to turn to God as His children. God holds us accountable when we refuse to convert ourselves. We should convert towards the spirit of God.

The meeting was called to order at 6:05 p.m.by Bob Henning.


- 1. Discussion of In-Person Worship
  - a) Need to determine when to resume in-person worship based on current COVID situation.
  - b) Bob recommends starting after 2/1. Others felt 3/1 or 4/1. Will need to analyze on month-by-month basis but no decision made at this time.
  - c) Pastor needs 2-week notice before in-person is started up again to do necessary preparations such as notifying the congregation.
  - d) Ash Wednesday is 2/17/21 and will need to make a decision about that service.
- 2. Reviewed minutes from the 11/23 meeting. Need to correct the spelling of Guild in Pastors report. Motion made to approve by Linda; 2<sup>nd</sup> by Judy K. Motion approved.
- 3. Treasurer report. Matt provided his report. We are still doing fine financially. We are still waiting for the invoice on Pastor's salary but have the funds needed for that. The Intercity application for the loan forgiveness has been approved. We can also reapply for more funds. Additional information will be coming. The check has been sent to Augusta Victoria Hospital and \$500 to Neighbors Place. Motion made by Linda to receive and hold for audit; 2<sup>nd</sup> by Judy Kort. Motion approved.

- 4. Financial Secretary report. Patti provided her report. We did receive payment for the October wedding of the non-members. Motion made by Rick to receive and hold for audit; 2<sup>nd</sup> by Matt. Motion approved.
- 5. Stewardship report by Rick Lohr. Follow up pledge card reminders sent out. Received 57 pledges for total of \$101344. Council felt the committee did a great job on this year's stewardship campaign. Status of annual contributions were normally sent out in November but didn't get sent this year. Will need to put as a task on the 2021 calendar so they are sent next November. Contribution statements for 2020 should be run this week. They will be available for pick up for a couple of weeks and then any remaining will be mailed out.
- 6. Worship report by Judy Kort. The Christmas Service and the Blue Christmas services were well done. Council complimented Pastor on the services as well as putting together the Bible studies.
- 7. Internet Connection for Sanctuary. Spectrum confirmed there will not be any additional cost for this as we are on their business program. The cost is a one-time fee. Need to confirm if we will be able to live stream from the projector room downstairs. Motion to approve the purchase made by Rick and 2<sup>nd</sup> by Sally. Motion carried. Matt will take funds from Special Miscellaneous now and then we will apply for funds from the Endowment Committee in the fall.
- 8. Budget discussion: Reviewed the preliminary budget put together by Matt. If Council approves, the plan is to put this budget in force on January 1. Then at the May congregational meeting, the budget can be reviewed and any adjustments made if needed. Congregation approval will be asked then. Motion made by Patti to accept the budget for 2021 to be put in place 1/1/21 and take to congregation for approval in May. Seconded by Rick. Motion carried. Rick will provide Matt with updates to the pledges as more come in.

Motion to adjourn by Linda; 2<sup>nd</sup> by Matt. The meeting was adjourned at 7:05 p.m. and closed with the Lord's Prayer.
