Greetings,

I hope all of you have had a safe and enjoyable summer, and that you are also able to find joy in the first signs of fall. The nights are beginning to get cooler, and trees are getting their first tinge of color. Soon fall will be here, giving us time to prepare for winter and the challenges it brings. We may tune up the snow blower, gather firewood, keep some warm clothing in our cars, stock up on ice melt, and keep some extra groceries and supplies in our homes. As we prepare ourselves for winter and the challenges it brings, so have we begun to prepare Immanuel Lutheran Church for the challenges we will face in the future. Like many churches, we continue to face challenges stemming from our large and aging facility, coupled with a decrease in membership and participation, and all in the context of a post-pandemic time of high inflation, civil unrest, and increasing divisiveness.

Addressing these challenges and preparing for future challenges continues to be the main focus of the Council. We have been prioritizing and planning preventative maintenance of our facility to avoid costly repairs in the future and making financially sound and frugal decisions. We also continue to work towards renting out unused or underused portions of our facility to provide additional revenue. We have reached out to United Way, and it is our hope that with them we will be able to find non-profit

tenants for these spaces. However, if we are unable to find non-profit tenants, we also have a contingency plan in place to allow for the possibility of renting to for-profit tenants.

We are also actively exploring the possibility of partnering with another local ELCA church to form a two-point parish. This would involve sharing a pastor with another church, which would allow Immanuel to keep our independence while also significantly decreasing our costs. Several other area churches have already done so, and our preliminary talks have been encouraging.



IMMANUEL HISTORY –



THE CHANCEL CROSS

Upon entering the sanctuary of Immanuel, one's eyes are drawn to the cross suspended over the altar in the church chancel. It must have been an impressive sight to congregational members when they first entered their new church building in late 1949. The architect no doubt wanted the cross suspended to emphasize its centrality as a symbol of the Christian faith. The chancel itself is deliberately uncluttered; the cross reigns high above the altar and maintains the focus of the worshippers. From afar its beauty is in its simplicity, but the cross itself has many symbols carved into it. The initials INRI meaning "Jesus of Nazareth King of the Jews" amidst rays of sunlight emanating from the center is featured as is the crown of thorns intertwined with the nails. The Trinity is symbolized by the Trefoil at each end of the cross, three lobes of equal size, yet one figure. It is an empty cross to emphasize that Christ died for our sins but rose again. He is our living, Lord. --- Al Solomonson

Our Adult Forum, The Search for Peace and Justice in the Holy Land, is a curriculum designed to be taught in a small group. Each unit will consist of a preliminary reading text, a multimedia presentation, a series of group discussion questions, and a list of further

resources. The first two units will provide participants with general background information on Christianity in the Holy Land, the origins of the Palestinian-Israeli Conflict, and how the occupation has affected Christians in the region. The second two units will focus on the contemporary political, social, and economic realities facing the peoples of Israel and Palestine, including the status of Jerusalem and life under the occupation. The last session will equip participants with the skills they will need to be able to advocate on behalf of Israelis and Palestinians to their representatives in government. Each session's video is approximately 50 minutes and includes discussion questions. **Do not worry, we will not spend our time watching the entire video** 2

Participants will learn...

- 1. Who the Christians of the Holy Land are, how they practice Christianity, why they are important to the global Church, and what challenges Christianity faces in the region today.
- 2. Why Israelis and Palestinians both claim historic ties to the Land, why these claims are in conflict, and when that conflict began.
- 3. How Palestinians and Israelis view the conflict differently, why these different perspectives on history make achieving peace difficult, and how learning to view the conflict from the perspective of the other is a necessary part of reconciliation.
- 4. Why Jerusalem is sacred for Jews, Christians, and Muslims, and why it is an important national symbol for both Israelis and Palestinians.
- 5. How the continuing occupation of the Palestinian territories has harmed both Israeli and Palestinian societies and the realities of contemporary human rights concerns in the occupied Palestinian territories (oPt).
- 6. How to be an effective advocate for a just peace in Israel and Palestine.

Rev. Sarras will inform you about the rest of the dates.



Racial Equity Training Offered in October

Racism has caused suffering for many years, yet many people don't know very much about why or how this happened. A sixhour training workshops for lay people (but anyone may attend) entitled "Learning and Telling the Story: "Deconstructing Racism" is being offered by The Racial Equity Team of our synod. Dr. Joyce Caldwell and Rev. Marilyn Miller of Leading for Racial Equity of Milwaukee will facilitate the workshop.

Caldwell and Miller provided anti-racism training for lay and rostered people several years ago in virtual format due to COVID 19. Their workshops have been very well received here and throughout the region, and Caldwell and Miller are recognized as national leaders in this work.

Participants may choose to attend either session: Friday, October 14 at Lutheran Church of the Wilderness or Saturday, October 15 at St. John Lutheran in Ashwaubenon. Ideally, participants will attend with one or two others from their congregation, ministry, or organization including a council or board member. Youth aged 13 and older are welcome as part of the team. Time will be included for these groups to discuss how to take this information back to their congregations, ministries, or organizations. Immanuel Lutheran Church Council Meeting – August 15, 2022

Members present: President Adam Doede, Pastor Niveen, Financial Secretary Jane Reilly-Smith, Council Secretary Patti Busche, Properties Bob Henning, Social Concerns Kathy Knox, Stewardship Rick Lohr, Education Judy Nickolai and Worship Judy Kort.

Members absent: Matt Munson.

Pastor led devotions based on the Apostles Creed. God created us and provides necessities. He protects and shields us out of Fatherly goodness and mercy. We face challenges and forget God is there to provide. He also provides people to comfort us and be there in times of trouble. God is there for us. Don't put our trust in money and property. Put our trust in the heavenly Lord. The meeting was called to order at 6:18 p.m.by Adam.

Pastor's Report:

- 1. I will be attending the 2022 Service and Justice conference "Becoming". The meeting will take place on Aug. 21-28. I have arranged with Rev. Jenn Hoffman to cover for me.
- 2. Tuesday, September 20, I will attend Anti-Bias Training for Rostered Ministers in Redeemer Lutheran Church, Stevens Point. This event is mandatory.
- 3. I will start a new confirmation class. We have between five to six students. I am in conversation with other churches to see whether we can partner with them in leading the confirmation class.
- 4. Our new administrative assistant, Michelle Cowan, is doing great so far. Emma Munson trained her very well. I am grateful for her time among us.
- 5. The back door is not functioning. We need to fix it as soon as possible.
- 6. We need to develop a policy regarding guest pastors conducting services at ILC. ELCA pastors have a protocol that we should commit ourselves to. See New Business.
- 7. Raising scholarship for Dar al Kalima (DAK) Lutheran University in Bethlehem, Palestine. I am working with the Dean of our conference to invite the churches to help in raising \$5000 to cover the tuition for one student. The university has five colleges, providing a diversity of critical areas of study to whet the appetite of many interests. Council discussion recommended tabling donations for Bright Stars and to work on creating a fund raiser within the congregation.
- 8. The Churches for Middle East Peace (CMEP) offers Curriculum Resources to elevate, educate, and advocate for peace, equality, security, and human rights in the Middle East. I want to use their curriculum for our adult

forum starting this September. The title of their curriculum is The Search for Peace and Justice The curriculum is designed to be taught in a small-group environment over five weeks. Each unit will consist of a preliminary reading text, a multimedia presentation, and a series of group discussion questions. CMEP asks us to consider \$175, but if this is not possible, we can donate as we can. I remember that we donated \$250 to CMEP last year or a year before. Motion made by Bob and 2 nd by Rick to make a donation of \$175 to come out of Adult Studies budget. Motion approved.

Secretary's report: Reviewed minutes from the 6/27/22 meeting. Motion made to approve by Rick, 2 nd by Bob. Motion approved.

Treasurer report: Motion made to hold for audit made by Rick and 2 nd by Bob. Motion approved.

Financial Secretary report: No report

Vice President: position vacant

President's report: Adam thanked all that helped with the special events that recently occurred. Reminder of upcoming Picnic and Semi-Annual meeting.

Education: – Sunday School will start on 9/11. They will be using the room in the north hallway and the Sunday School office.

Properties: Knox box has been hung. Work was done on the door lock which was also cleaned on 8/14.

Our certification on the elevator has expired and we will go through the needed process to get re-certified. It passed inspection but does need an oil change. Recommendation to use the same person this year as we did last year for snow removal.

Stewardship: Committee met and are working on commitment Sunday. Letters, a video and cards will be made.

Social Concerns: Next meal will be 8/28.

Worship: In addition to the schedule of participants, Judy requested that a list of names and phone numbers of all volunteers be made up for ease of finding a substitute as needed. Patti asked if unfamiliar hymns can be sung to more familiar music. This should encourage more singing.

Unfinished Business:

- 1. Semi-annual meeting will be 9/18. Committee reports should be sent to church office by 9/1. Meeting will be held in the sanctuary. Will have election of Vice-President.
- 2. September 11 church picnic in fellowship hall. Church service will be held at 9:00. God's work our hands will put together kits between church service and picnic. Pastor encouraged everyone to invite those that haven't attended church in a while.
- 3. Audit Adam will follow up to find out if date has been set by committee.
- 4. ILC Rental rental of 1st floor and 2nd floor rooms is a viable option.

Basement not rentable on its own but some rooms could be rented for storage. Elevator access is selling point. Challenges are no air conditioning and there is not a good way to segregate rental from non-rental areas.

Wausau Fire Department would need to be involved if security gates were to be installed. Next step is to contact a property management company to get an idea of costs for them to handle leases. We should also reach out to group with contacts in a lot of non-profit organizations.

- 5. Naomi support motion made by Bob to finished pledged amount for this year but not to continue support. 2nd by Patti. Motion approved.
- 6. New Administrative Assistant Michelle is on board. Stop in to meet her.

New Business:

Guest Pastor policy has been drafted.

Policy on guest Pastors performing ceremonies at Immanuel Lutheran Church, ELCA

In certain circumstances, a member or family belonging to ILC may request a guest Pastor to perform various ceremonies, rituals, or rites at ILC. These may include, but are not limited to, funerals, weddings, baptisms, etc. In these situations, the guest Pastor is to take a supportive or assisting role while ILC's Pastor is to maintain the primary role. In the case of extenuating circumstances, ILC's Council has final discretion in the application of this policy.

Motion made by Rick to approve the proposed wording. 2nd by Bob. Motion approved.
