Dear Immanuel Lutheran Church family,

Greetings to you from Bethlehem, Palestine. I am writing you from Bethlehem, where Jesus was born! I am very blessed to be among my family and relatives. I am enjoying every single minute with my nieces. Bethlehem 20 years ago is different than now, there are lots of new buildings and development. The only thing that is the same is the Israeli military occupation that continues to impact every aspect of daily life for Palestinians: restricting movement, imposing discriminatory control, and threatening homes and livelihoods.

The major disturbing event I experienced was the killing of Shreen Abu Akleh, a longtime TV correspondent for Al Jazeera Arabic, by Israeli forces. While Abu Akleh was covering Israeli army raids in the city of Jenin in the northern occupied West Bank, Israeli forces shot her dead. Abu Akleh was wearing a press vest and was standing with other journalists when she was killed. At her funeral, her coffin almost fell as police, some using batons, waded into a crowd of Palestinians gathered around it. I was deeply disturbed by the police's violent act. Her death and funeral emerged with heavy tears and loud, pain-filled cries. My family and I were in tears while watching Abu Akleh's funeral.

Despite the deep pain, I enjoyed being with my family and visiting my relatives and church. In every house I visited, the main topic of conversation was serving the church and keeping faith in Christ. Palestinian Christians were shocked and thrilled to see for the first time a Palestinian female pastor. Some were uncomfortable, but others were happy and excited to shake my hand.

We, Palestinian Christians, often refer to ourselves as living stones, quoting Peter 2:6, "They are some of the living stones who make up the church, whose cornerstone is Jesus Christ." Palestinian Christians are often called the 'living stones' of Christianity as we can trace our history to Pentecost, 2,000 years ago. We still witness and live our faith despite all adversities.

Here in the USA, we also keep the faith. Unlike Palestinian Christians, we live in free land that honors its citizens' rights and dignity. We live in a country where we feel safe to travel and have a comfortable life. Palestinian Christians do not have these privileges. Therefore, I encourage you to continue to pray for an end to the Palestinian-Israeli conflict over the land and for "justice to roll down like waters, and righteousness like an ever-flowing stream" (Amos 5:24).

THE BIBLE CAMP

Immanuel Lutheran was one of a few congregations in central Wisconsin that joined together to build a Lutheran Bible camp at Mission Lake near Bevent in the 1940s. The location was called Crooked Lake then and was the site of a former dance hall. Many volunteers did the physical labor needed to bring the camp to reality. The camp, later called Waypost, has been an important part of Immanuel's ministry over the years as it maintained close ties with the program there. Until recent years it was a tradition to have the summer congregational picnic with a brief worship service at the camp. Many families from the congregation helped initiate a family camping experience there as well, and for some it became a summer tradition. It was not uncommon for college students from Immanuel to work as counsellors and assistants at the camp. Vonnie and Bob Henning spent several summers on the staff there; Vonnie was the head cook and Bob was the camp handyman. Immanuel members usually participated in spring and fall work days when the camp was prepared for a seasonal change. The camp provided many memorable experiences for our youth who participated in the required week of confirmation camp there.

Association of Lutherans of Arab and Middle Eastern Heritage The Palestinian-American journalist Shireen Abu Akleh was assassinated while reporting on Israeli attacks in the West Bank on Thursday May 12, 2022. She was wearing protective head gear and a bullet proof vest which was clearly marked PRESS when she was gunned down.

Her peaceful funeral procession was attacked by Israeli police hitting pallbearers with batons, attacking mourners with smoke grenades and shooting rubber bullets.

The Association of Lutheran of Arab and Middle Eastern Heritage are calling on our church to be informed of the reality regarding war crimes against Palestinians.

We cannot tolerate or stay silent regarding the crimes of the Israeli occupation. We are requesting that our church and US government hold the Israeli government accountable for this and other unjust violence committed against the Palestinian people.

We are also asking that an independent international (not Israeli) investigation be implemented right away.
